Who We Are

The Volunteer Engagement Program connects Ottawa Community Housing (OCH) residents with the broader community through meaningful volunteer opportunities across OCH neighbourhoods.

We engage volunteers year-round in neighbourhood-focused projects that enhance the look and feel of communities, often supporting capital or property management priorities when possible.

Capital repair expenses such as structural repairs and retrofits are a priority in OCH's Strategic Plan – to ensure we are maintaining and preserving homes for current and future tenants. Volunteers play a huge part in being able to implement community improvement projects that help tenants to feel pride in their communities.

Why It Matters

A beautiful and welcoming community makes a big difference in the lives of our tenants. They make a building a home. Improvements to common areas, such as new furniture in the lounge or a sectional bench in the courtyard, can have far-reaching benefits beyond just the physical infrastructure.

Since 2011, we have focused on these major event types:



Painting

A fresh coat of paint in a community lounge, hallways or lobby can make a big difference in brightening up a space.

Building

From benches to pergolas, building events are focused on creating spaces for residents to make connections and engage with their neighbours.

Landscaping

Revitalizing and creating more green space increases residents satisfaction with their community - from planting tiny forests to community gardens.

What Makes Up the Volunteer Engagement Program?

1 Corporate Volunteerism

Corporate groups and partners participate in the program for a chance to learn something new and make a meaningful difference in their community alongside their teams.

Our VEP currently has 40 corporate groups who volunteer with us on a regular basis.

2 Employee Engagement

Many OCH teams see the Employee Engagement
Program (EEP) as an opportunity for team building and cross-department collaboration. It's a great way for OCH staff to meet OCH residents and community partners and spend time in the communities we serve.



Providing Work Experience

We work with colleges and universities in Ottawa to support students looking to gain work experience and give them a paid placement working with our corporation. We also work closely with agencies funded by Immigration and Refugee Citizenship Canada to support newcomers to Canada in securing unpaid work placements at OCH. VEP oversees matching, onboarding and provides references post placement.

OCH regularly assists a yearly average of **10 students** and new Canadians in gaining on the job skills training, and provides experiential learning opportunities to support career growth and future employment.

Tenants Volunteering in Communities

The Community Development Team at OCH engages with tenant volunteers across the corporation. Tenant volunteers work hard to build and enhance social cohesion by leveraging a communities' strengths and offering social opportunities to convene and build capacity with the view of improving the well-being of communities. There are 77 active tenant groups across OCH with over 500 tenants engaged, who volunteer their time on a range of initiatives – from food security to hosting social activities and events. For example, OCH is home to 280 raised bed garden boxes, with community garden groups led by our tenant volunteers.

In 2024, tenant volunteers supported more than **2,000 OCH community events** – bringing residents, partners and OCH together to address community goals and opportunities.

Community Capital Fund

Since its launch in 2009, the Community Capital Fund has responded to community requests to support tenant led efforts to build and renovate community assets and fund skills development to support the creation of healthy, engaged neighbourhoods. \$175,416.34 was invested through 49 projects in 2024.







The Community Capital Fund has been a reliable funding stream for the Community Development team to leverage with tenant volunteers as it aims to support ongoing efforts to build and sustain community-led programming and activities as well as enhance pride of place. By equipping communities and tenant volunteers with physical assets like garden beds, communal seating areas and community kitchen supplies, we help to empower and support the volunteer spirit of OCH communities.

Need Assessment in OCH Communities


The VEP team sends a call-out to the community development team and the property management team to identify projects needed in the community. Various meetings and discussions with all parties are held with tenants to identify their needs. The community development team and the property management team play a crucial role during this phase.

Site Inspection

Site inspections are scheduled with the VE team, property manager, community developer and tenants from the community. The objective of the site inspection is to identify the scope of work and to schedule any site preparation needed before the event.







Various corporate partnerships are explored by the VE team. A call for action is placed in the community.

Matching Projects with Volunteer Groups

The VE team matches the corporate volunteer groups with the identified projects for the year. The matching process is based on the project priority, preference from the volunteer group. priorities in the community and weather conditions.





Preparation and Event Day

The VE team works in collaboration with various OCH teams like the maintenance team, landscaping team and asset management to ensure all preparation is done prior to the event. The final step is the day of action, where the corporate volunteer group is onsite in the community to work hand in hand with various staff and tenant leaders.









Corporate volunteer groups in 2024

Building Impact Together



70 volunteers from Home Depot Canada (Team Depot) from six stores across Ottawa (and Montreal!) got to work in the Strathcona Heights community. They built benches, picnic tables, a deck, pergola and cleared overgrowth. The project was inspired by tenants and the Sandy Hill Community Health Centre, a valued partner of OCH.

Despite a downpour, nearly 200 Export Development Canada volunteers got a chance to get to know our Overbrook community and leave a legacy. Thanks to a city-wide, large-scale collaboration between EDC and Volunteer Ottawa called Community Investment Day, **EDC volunteers** planted nearly 60 trees in the community to replace those lost due to

the Derecho Storm and add to the green canopy of the neighbourhood. They also replaced mulch in local playgrounds, cleared overgrowth and spruced up the neighbourhood.

The Russell Heights community celebrated a big improvement in their outdoor community space - a new outdoor gym featuring seating and recreational games called 1700 Spot.

This gym is the result of a two-year project developed in partnership with Carleton University's Azrieli School of Architecture and Urbanism. Carleton

students collaborated with the Russell Heights Community House to present design ideas for community enhancements, incorporating feedback from residents into the final plan.

The unveiling event highlighted the new outdoor fitness space with a mini-Olympic competition, inviting local children to compete for medals in chin-ups, push-ups, and jump rope challenges.

Employee Engagement Program

Building Impact Together



The Preventative Maintenance Team along with other staff at OCH spent the day in Perth at the Christie Lake Kids Camp. Over the course of the day, the team built two new decks, a new sectional bench, and installed new flooring in the main hall. They also repaired 28 doors, installed 18 new LED lights, and made other various repairs.

Our partners at Christie Lake Kids help children and families living in our communities through after-school programming and unforgettable summer camp experiences. Every year, almost 400 children and youth aged 9 – 15 attend a summer camp session at the organization's campground near Perth.

85% of youth attending Christie Lake Kids Camp live in OCH communities.

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One of our team members attended the camp as a former tenant with OCH. He shared his story and appreciation for the camp and how they helped to shape who he is today. It was very heartwarming and provided a real connection to why we do the work we do.

Spending time helping to set future campers up for success and seeing the relief and happiness that our work brought to the camp staff was an amazing feeling. The team continues to talk about it and insists we go every year to build on our progress from the year before.

OCH's Tenant Services Leadership team joined forces with The Royal Ottawa Mental Health Centre and the John Howard Society of Ottawa to build, fill and repair garden beds at the Lebreton Transitional

Rehabilitation Program (Lebreton House). The Lebreton Transitional Rehabilitation Program provides supportive housing to clients of the ROH to facilitate their transition from the rehabilitation unit to independent living in the community, quite often an OCH community.

The garden beds will be a sustainable food source for program clients. Thanks to a bursary from Just Food Ottawa (another OCH partner!), clients will be empowered to plant and nurture their own seeds in the garden beds.





Thanks to a grant from the City of Ottawa and the Ottawa Community Benefits Network Workforce Development Program, 20 youth had the opportunity to learn more about construction trades.

Participants completed an interlock pad under a pergola recently built by youth in the community in the backyard of the Foster Farm Community House.

Over the last two years, several volunteer groups have contributed to enhancing this space. These improvements are thanks to the collaboration of OCH Foundation, the Volunteer Engagement Program, Property Management and our Community Development team.

The Foster Farm Community House provides important services to residents, including food banks, after-school programs, summer camps, and adult programs. With food security needs rising by 45 percent, their work is more important than ever.

The additional space provided by recent improvements has allowed residents to gather in the space, forging connections. Recently, an adult art class could do a woodburning project thanks to the covered space in the backyard provided by the pergola.
